Life Matters: Working together to raise suicide awareness

On September 20, people throughout the Panhandle will participate in the Out of the Darkness Community Walks in Alliance and Scottsbluff. The walk's primary goal is to raise awareness of the devastating effects of suicide and to raise funds for local and national suicide prevention and awareness programs.

The Alliance walk begins at 8 am, registration from 7 am to 8 am at the Performing Arts Center at 1450 Box Butte Avenue. The Scottsbluff walk starts at 9 am, registration from 8 am to 9 am at the Riverside Zoo Pavilion walking trail.

“Suicide is a public health problem and is plagued by silence and stigma that continue to be barriers for seeking help,” stated Janelle Hansen, Health Educator for Panhandle Public Health District. “These walks help bring suicide out of the darkness and raise money for education, prevention and awareness programs.”

One in four people live with a mental health condition. This means that someone you know, has or probably had thoughts of suicide. We never know what another person is going through. This is a public health issue that does not discriminate by age, gender, ethnicity, or socio economic status.

Suicide leaves behind countless family members and friends wondering, “Why did this happen?” “How will I get through it?”

The Suicide prevention lifeline is a number you can call if you have a friend, neighbor and co-worker who is really struggling and you are wondering how to be supportive.
